Parson to Person by Pastor Dave

Ah, February! Still winter, but with encouraging signs. Holidays behind us, we're pretty much recovered by now, and all the stuff we postponed till January is just about done. A time where we enjoy the delights of Love in honor of St. Valentine, and the brevity of the shortest month of the year.

In our church life, February is a blossoming time. All the seeds we planted together through Advent and the dreams we nourish in our weekly worship and our annual meetings have taken a bit of rootedness now. In honor of these blooming times ahead of us, I would like to share an encouraging vision for our spiritual home, Trinity UMC.

I think we can honestly say that our attitude is bright, our attendance is increasing, our ministry in the community is visible and strong, and our desire to do the right thing is undiminished. Post-COVID, as we all limp back from the enforced isolation, these are all really, really good things. I also think I can honestly say that, no matter how complete our post -pandemic recovery, we are not quite as zippy as we were a few years ago. Most of this is simply biology, as our bodies and minds slow down a bit, and as fatigue comes earlier and earlier in the day.

But not all of it... our society suffered mightily from not only the disease but the enforced estrangement. Many of us couldn't wait to get back among others, but some discovered that they were just fine with solitude and separateness. There are quite a few beloved Trinity kin that are joining in less fre-

quently, and some who have basically disappeared into another way of life, another set of habits. The root causes of these realities are many, but the net effect on the church is singular: the church suffers. St. Paul said that when one part of the body suffers, the whole body suffers with it. By extension then, when one church member is discouraged, we all feel the malaise. When one church member feels estranged, that tension is shared by everyone.

You know the old saying about how you can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink? This is a real working model for the church – that we offer 'living water' on Sundays, vibrant, uplifting worship and ideas that actually help with our actual lives. We offer, and offer, and try to include and welcome and encourage, but ultimately whether our 'living water' is sipped or gulped or ignored or spit out is a most individual choice. And if enough individuals choose to say 'no, thanks', we are all more diminished.

We cannot control or manage other people's choices, but we can do all in our power to make our local version of 'living water' as palatable, fresh, and inviting as possible. Of all the choices one might make on a Sunday morning, we want joining in at Trinity to head the list. And we will achieve

that goal, friends, when our aliveness, our authenticity, and our compassionate spirits combine to create an experience of holy community that is distinctive and not to be found anywhere else.

I close with a quote from the incredibly wise Howard Thurman: "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." I am inviting you to find part of your aliveness, part of your unique gift in service of God and neighbor here at Trinity. Together, we have all the treasure, talent, time, and tenderness that any church could ask for. We just need to grow it, nurture it, and let it transform our lives and the life of our community.

Jan. 18th, the first meeting of the New Year opened with the election of new officers who will lead the ladies to promote fellowship, disseminate information of wide interest thru speakers and schedule fundraisers to donate to their preferred charities. 


Coffee Hour
