News from Healthbridge Global

Romania - The RISE TOGETHER project in Targu Mures, Romania will be an innovative mental health & trauma healing center, providing personalized care for state institutionalized orphans who have been the victims of abuse & neglect. It will function as a daily care & counseling center, a training facility, & a transitional living facility for a subset of young adults aging out of the system. We launched this project in February.

Healthbridge Global has also long been involved with developing the LIFE Medical Center, their 2nd partnership with the ProVita Foundation of Romania. It will be the first non-abortive maternity hospital in one of the historic abortion capitals of the world!

India - Healthcare is used in villages to help Indian pastors build trust, show compassion, & open gospel doors. Each year, a team of Americans & Indians come together to break new ground for the gospel by hosting medical camps. Afterward, on-going care & procedures are coordinated locally by Indian physicians. From November 4 –16, twenty-three American doctors & volunteers joined our Indian partners for a week of medical camps. While there, local authorities responded to complaints of Christian work in the area. They confiscated American passports & came close to shutting the medical camps down before they'd even begun. Yet, due to the obvious good done over the years & the reputation that has been built, both permission & encouragement were given from higher up (literally and spiritually) to continue. In the end, many received compassionate care: 6,540: total patients seen 3,219: eye-related issues cared for 1,346: primary care visits provided 1,445: dental procedures provided 530: cardiac and ENT care visits 697: cataract and pterygium surgeries 2,800: custom eyeglasses made.

Healthbridge Global has many projects all over the world, but began through the inspiration of Jon Hallsted and his wife Rebecca from right here in northern California. Their aim is to expose people to the love and grace of Christ through providing medical care. You can find out more at healthbridgeglob-al.org
